- i) Karma is a story about Sir Mohan Lal (Native Indian) who looks down on his fellow countrymen including his wife and embraces the English ways and culture. He had a reservation on everything English like English cigarette, Whiskey, The Times News Paper and clothing. When the train was about to leave two English soldiers go to the cabin he is occupying and threw him out of the train with his luggage. It may be true that moral-seekers are apt to find Khushwant Singh's "Karma" a little too predictable, even simplistic. For them, Sir Mohan Lal's is just another story of pride that goes before a fall. In its widely understood sense, "karma" is "the sum total of the ethical consequences of a person's good and bad actions . . . that is held in Hinduism and Buddhism to determine his specific destiny in his next existence" ("Karma"). On this count, Lal's sin of pride is punished when two British soldiers throw him out of a first-class compartment. His wife's karma, it would seem, enables her to have a safe and comfortable journey in a ladies' compartment.
- ii) The poem by Robert Browning is about the secret meeting of the lover and his beloved at midnight. The poem describes the journey of the lover and his desperation to meet his beloved.

We are given to understand that the beloved also waits eagerly for the lover and the meeting at night is a moment of fulfillment the wish of both. Though the actual meeting is described in only the last four lines, it has been done so with great mastery of description, which makes them intensely passionate and exciting. The beating of their hearts represents the joy and excitement of the meeting together. The title, thus, is appropriate and well thought out which points towards the theme and meaning of the poem.

- iii) Sidda, in his attempt to be more friendly with Leela, had to tell her a couple of lies and one of them was that he could touch the Moon. He told her that he had touched the Moon several times, perched on a coconut palm. To prove that he knew the Moon, he showed Leela the Moon in the sky and then brought her to their well and showed her the Moon's reflection in the water too. Seeing this, she was thrilled and asked him how he was able to make the Moon fall into the well and Sidda replied that he had asked the Moon to follow them to the well. Thus Leela believed Sidda, this made Leela Supremely happy.
- iv) One evening Sidda went out to buy sugar and Leela went with him. When they came home, Leela's mother noticed that a gold chain Leela had been wearing was missing. When Sidda was called in to ask about this, she thought that he looked queer. She asked him about the chain. His throat went dry. He blinked and answered that he did not know. She mentioned the police and shouted at him. When she returned from the kitchen, Sidda had vanished into the night. This hardened her suspicion upon Sidda.

Leela's parents were not remarkably anything to her. Her father had no time to spend with her and mother often scolded her. She was not fond of telling her stories which Leela was always crazy about. In fact all that Leela loved was stories. Sidda was an amazing story teller. He knew how to grab Leela's heart by telling unfailing stories about anything. Leela held her mother responsible for Sidda's disappearance.

- a) The poem by Robert Browning is about the secret meeting of the lover and his beloved at midnight. The poem describes the journey of the lover and his desperation to meet his beloved. We are given to understand that the beloved also waits eagerly for the lover and the meeting at night is a moment of fulfillment the wish of both. Though the actual meeting is described in only the last four lines, it has been done so with great mastery of description, which makes them intensely passionate and exciting. The beating of their hearts represents the joy and excitement of the meeting together. The title, thus, is appropriate and well thought out which points towards the theme and meaning of the poem.
- b) The title of the poem refers to the sick rose in the poem that falls victim to the worm's "dark secret love". The poem is called "The Sick Rose," but we don't learn a whole lot about the rose's sickness; we're tempted to think that sickness is a metaphor for something else, perhaps for a certain view of love that the poem argues is destructive. If the rose is a symbol of love or passion, and the rose is sick, then perhaps our ideas about love and passion are sick as well. We think of love, which is pretty much synonymous with sex in this poem, as something to be kept "dark" and "secret." Well, it turns out that that idea of love can have destructive consequences: it destroys the rose.
- c) In the poem "Meeting at Night", the poet describes the sea as both enchanting and romantic. The sea seems to be grey and the waves are startled at the disturbance made by the boat of the narrator. There is a cove and slushy sand, which is followed by a warm sea, scented beach. The night is also enchanting with a yellow half moon, which makes the sea look grey and the land look dark. It is the time when there is nobody around and only those who have a mission to accomplish venture out. In the dark night, the blue spurt of a lighted match could be seen clearly which is a symbol that the darkness of the land has ignited the passion of the lovers who meet secretly under the cover of the night.
- d) This poem is often described as enigmatic and irritating poem. The poet Blake, in his deceptive embellished diction, states that love is injurious. The poem describes the parasitical relationship between the rose and the worm. The worm loves Rose for a beautiful comfortable abode however its [worm's] dark secret love is slowly sickening and destroying Rose's life.
- e) "Meeting at Night" describes the journey of a lover through sea and land to meet his beloved. In the half moon of the night, the sea looks grey while the land looks black. With the yellow moon visible in the sky, which looks large and low, the narrator sails towards the land in a boat. The waves look like flaming ringlets in the moonlight. The narrator secures his boat in the slushy land. Then he walks through the beach, which is a mile in length. He also crosses three fields and reaches the farmhouse of his beloved. He reaches the place just to feel the presence of his beloved.
