AUTHOR

Gerald Durrell was a British pioneering naturalist, conservationist, author, founder of a unique zoo in Jersey, and a TV presenter. He was known for his pioneering work in preserving endangered animal species. Born in British India, his formative years were spent on the Greek island of Corfu, where he came across a variety of creatures. This inculcated in him a passion for animals, and he became a champion for the cause of endangered and neglected species. After working for a Bedfordshire zoo, he later set out on wildlife expeditions and collected rare animal species. On the Channel Island of Jersey, he founded the 'Durrell Wildlife Conservation Trust and the Jersey Zoo' (in 1959), a place that exhibits his passion for saving endangered species against all odds. He has written over 35 fictional and non-fictional books about his expeditions and animals. His best-selling autobiographical, 'My Family and Other Animals,' (1956) was made into a successful 4-season TV series, 'The Durrells.' Many rare species have been named after him.

SUMMARY

The author explains how different is it to live in a zoo and look at it from the inside than visiting a zoo for a few hours as an outsider. A day in the zoo starts just before dawn very early in the morning. One can hear the birds singing and the peahens getting ready to dance. At eight o'clock the zoo staff arrives. Some of these include prodding the animals and throwing stones at them if they are asleep and giving lighted cigarettes and razor blades to animals. Towards the evening the visiting crowd thins out from the zoo. During this time while the other animals and birds go to rest themselves the owls that have spent all day pretending to be grey tree stumps and open their large golden eyes and get ready for their time. Lying on bed one can see the moon separating itself from the shadows of the trees as it moves up the sky. The lion can be heard coughing. Soon it would be dawn and the chorus of the birds would take over and soon it is time for another day in the zoo.

QUESTION – ANSWER
