Descriptive and Analytical Questions :

a) "I'm tired of people telling me I have a pretty face".

Who said this to whom and when? What did the person spoken to reply?1+1+2+2Ans: The girl said the above line to the narrator when the narrator complimented her by saying thatShe had an interesting face.

In course of the journey the narrator had tried his level best to hide the fact that he was blind .He had daringly complemented the girl by saying that she had an interesting face .On hearing this the girl had laughed pleasantly and had commented that people mostly found her face to be pretty which she was tired of hearing .She seemed to be pleased on hearing the narrator's different comment. The girl had called the narrator 'gallant'.

b) "The voice had the sparkle of a mountain stream".

Identify the text. Who thinks so? Whose voice is referred to here? Why did the voice become so special ? 1+1+1+3

Ans: The above line has been extracted from Ruskin Bond's short story, "The Eyes Have It".

The narrator in the above mentioned story thought so.

The voice of the girl , whom the narrator met during his train journey is referred to here. The narrator could not see the girl as he was blind. He only felt her presence through hearing. He liked her voice very much. He was prepared to sit there for any length of time to listen to her voice. The narrator felt that her voice was as lively and delightful as the sparkle of a mountain stream. c) "She would forget our brief encounter?"

Who said this and about whom? What is the brief encounter referred to here? Why did the speaker think so? 1+1+2+2

Ans: The narrator said this about the girl who travelled with him in the same compartment from Rohana to Saharanpur.

The lively conversation between the narrator and the girl about the beauty of the hills of Mussoorie in October, the view of landscape from the train's window between Rohana and Saharanpur has been described as the brief encounter.

The girl became relieved when the narrator informed her that her station will arrive soon. The narrator was ready and eager to sit in the train compartment for any length of time to hear the girl's voice. The journey that was cherished by him was of little importance to her. The narrator had a feeling that the girl would forget their brief encounter.

d. Comment on the ending of the story "The Eyes Have It"?

Ans: It was through the eyes of the new co-passenger who boarded the train at Saharanpur that the narrator got to know that the girl was blind. From the very beginning the narrator had tried to conceal his blindness. The girl too had not revealed her blindness. Though none of them could see yet they perceived each other through their senses. The new traveller certainly changed the flow of thought of the narrator as well as the readers. The ending comes with a revelation and is open ended.

e) Do you agree that the story "The Eyes Have It" is a comment on 'seeing'? Give instances from the text. Ans: The narrator of the above mentioned story is blind and thus he writes from a blind man's perspective and expresses his deep desire for vision. The narrator conceals his lack of vision by answering the questions asked by the girl by using his mind's eye. He uses sentences like "Have you noticed"? Another instance... "that the trees seem to be moving while we seem to be standing still." Even the blind narrator compliments the girl by saying that "You have an interesting face". He believed that his comment would make the girl feel that he was a normal sighted person. Throughout the story there are various instances to prove the narrator's desperation to perceive the girl through his eyes. The desire was so intense that even after the girl left , he asked his new fellow-traveller about the style of the girl's hair. He tried to create the girl's image in his mind with the help of all the available information about her. The entire story revolves round the narrator's desire to see, the desire to defy his present state of blindness by using his other senses and his power of imagination. Thus, it can be rightly

said that the above mentioned story is a comment on seeing.

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
